California Association of Mutual Water Companies (CalMutuals) Board of Directors Meeting Minutes September 6, 2017

<u>Call to Order:</u> Chair Lisa Yamashita-Lopez called the meeting to order at 10:38 a.m.

<u>Present:</u> Lisa Yamashita-Lopez (Director, President & Chair), Dave Armstrong (Director, Vice President), Dave Michalko (Director, Secretary), Doug Nunneley (Director), Jim Byerrum (Director), Ken Bradbury (Director), Rick Cook (Director), Ken Tcheng (Director), Adan Ortega (Staff, Executive Director), Denise Peralta Gailey (Staff, Managing Director), Myra Evangelista (Staff, Treasurer), Jim Ciampa (Legal Counsel), Lynda Noriega, Armando De La Paz, Kelly Jensen (Legislative Advocate – by teleconference).

Absent: None.

Review and Approval of the August 15, 2017 Board Meeting Minutes: On a motion made by Director Bradbury, seconded by Secretary Michalko, the August 15, 2017 board meeting minutes were unanimously approved, as submitted.

<u>Legislative Committee</u>: Director Armstrong reported on various legislative issues that the legislative committee is tracking, including: (1) SB623 Monning; (2) AB1000 Friedman; (3) AB18 Garcia; (4) SB5 De Leon; (5) AB 1668 Friedman, and; (6) SB 606 Skinner/Hertzberg. Legislative Advocate Jensen reported that SB 623 is a two-year bill despite contradicting reports. No further comments.

2018 Legislative Priorities: Executive Director Ortega provided an overview of the policy principles framework for AB 401 and SB 623 (Monning) dealing with the human right to water, affordability of water and assisting disadvantaged communities. After deliberation and on a motion made by Director Byerrum, seconded by Vice President Armstrong, the board voted to approve the development of policy principles to: (1) outline priorities pertaining to the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA); (2) consolidation; (3) the lack of a state equivalent of a 501c12 tax exemption status for mutual water companies and; (4) the county-level tax exemption status for mutual water companies. Managing Director Peralta Gailey reported that staff will begin planning for the 2018 lobby day based on the 2018 legislative priorities outlined and approved by the board. Managing Director Peralta Gailey also reported that the board had previously nominated Assembly Member Cristina Garcia to receive the "Small System Award;" she requested the board's approval to move forward with hosting an in-district reception in her honor. On a motion made by Director Tcheng, seconded by Vice President Armstrong, the reception honoring Assembly Member Cristina Garcia was approved.

<u>Chair's Report:</u> Chair Yamashita-Lopez reported that JPRIMA renewals would now be charged the CalMutuals membership fee that had been previously waived during the first year. She added that Susan Allen at Ortega Strategies Group (OSG) would be managing the membership renewal process. Chair Yamashita-Lopez also reported that staff is researching software options to streamline data management.

<u>Transfer of the Regulatory Affairs Committee to JPRIMA</u>: On a motion made by Director Bradbury, seconded by Director Tcheng, the board voted to establish an ad hoc committee to review the possible transfer of the regulatory affairs committee to JPRIMA and present those finding to the board.

<u>California Water Fix</u>: After deliberation among the board of directors, it was decided that the decision to support the California Water Fix would be left to each individual member.

Executive Director's Report: Executive Director Ortega reported that Jim Nichols of the San Luis Canal Company has expressed interest in joining the board of directors. Executive Director Ortega added that he will have more information to provide the board during the next meeting. General Counsel Ciampa added that the nomination of a new director will require the establishment of a nominating committee.

Realignment of Membership Dues Schedule: Comments for this item were provided during the Chair's report.

Director Comments: None.

Adjourn: Chair Yamashita-Lopez adjourned the meeting at 12: 07 p.m.

Draft CalMutuals Policy Principles

The CalMutuals Board of Directors approved a motion on September 6, 2017, directing staff to draft policy principles for the 2018 legislative session. The policy principles are to consider issues that were: a) passed or continued during the first year of the 2017-18 legislative session; and b) matters that are pending before the legislature in the form of 2 year bills in that session.

These Policy Principles are intended to conform to and further the Association's mission and vision, as set forth below:

Mission: California Association of Mutual Water Companies supports, educates and represents mutual water companies in the legislative process, development of policies, and allocation of resources.

Vision: Mutual water companies working together for mutual benefit, acting with one voice.

A. Enacted Laws and Regulations

1. Introduction:

To focus experienced and expert Cal Mutuals' members on particular issues raised by particular proposed or recently enacted laws and regulations, during 2017, the board established task forces on the following matters:

Water Quality:

Task Force on Hexavalent Chromium Task Force on 1,2,3, TCP

Water Affordability, Technical Assistance and Consolidations*:

Task Force on AB401 Low Income Rate Assistance Implementation

The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act

2. Policy Principles:

The CalMutuals Board of Directors establishes the following policy principles to guide task force and staff actions in policy forums, multi-party working groups, and development of Association positions, comment letters and testimony:

1. <u>Affordability</u> -- must be a central consideration in establishing state and regional policies that affect mutual water companies and small systems. Affordability is to be accounted

for not only by accounting for cost thresholds of mutual water companies and small systems and the economic impact upon their customers, but to include determining the effectiveness of the delivery of state grants, loans and assistance.

- 2. <u>Efficiency</u> -- Cal Mutuals will strive to ensure the regional and statewide value generated by operational efficiencies of mutual water companies and small systems that result from compliance with new legislative and regulatory requirements is recognized on equal footing with other water use efficiency measures, including recycled water.
- 3. Participation and Equity - Mutual water companies should be treated in a non-discriminatory basis, in relation to other types of water suppliers, in matters regarding regional and local water system governance, including groundwater sustainability agencies (GSAs), consolidations, and other forms of joint governance, particularly in light of their tax contributions, property rights, voting rights, and investments by shareholders in their water systems.

Pending Legislation: On matters pending before the legislature and other issues of concern to mutual water companies that may pertain to potential legislation, the Board of Directors approves the following policy principles:

- 1. Unfair Taxation & Financial Requirements:
- a) CalMutuals will seek solutions that resolve the double property tax taxation of mutual water companies, whose shareholders are also assessed for their mutual water company's valuation through the property tax rolls in some counties.
- b) CalMutuals will endeavor to reconcile laws (including through possible statutory amendments) enforced by the California Franchise Tax Board that are inconsistent with Federal IRS tax laws governing 501(c) 12 tax-exempt corporations.
- c) CalMutuals will, at both the federal and state levels, seek to expand tax-exemptions for mutual water company revenues when those revenues are invested in capital and maintenance.
- d) CalMutuals will collaborate with other water associations and interested parties to find alternatives to proposed taxes on customer water bills that produce revenues or revenue systems that allow assistance to small, poor and older water systems.
- e) CalMutuals will engage with appropriate parties to find alternatives to the financial review requirement of AB240 as to mutual water companies with less than 1,000 connections.

- 2. Conservation as a Way of Life Legislation:
- a) Water rights ensure that all water rights, as they currently exist, remain recognized to their full extent and are not compromised by mandated conservation;
- Management affordability ensure that all operational requirements imposed under the legislation remain affordable and do not result in unintended consequences that adversely impact a mutual water company's or small system's ability to continue to operate;
- Recycled water ensure that the use of recycled water and other alternative water sources is incentivized, including removing any sunset date on any recycled water credits against water use objectives and an ongoing recycled water credit above 10% (30% is ideal);
- d) Fair enforcement process ensure applicable water suppliers are provided with appropriate notice and hearing opportunities before significant penalties may be imposed for violation of the legislation.
- e) Future Regulations ensure that any future regulations to be adopted by the State Water Resources Control Board, the Department of Water Resources or any other state agency are adopted through appropriate process that ensure stakeholder and other public input; with the use of emergency regulatory powers limited to times of true emergency.
